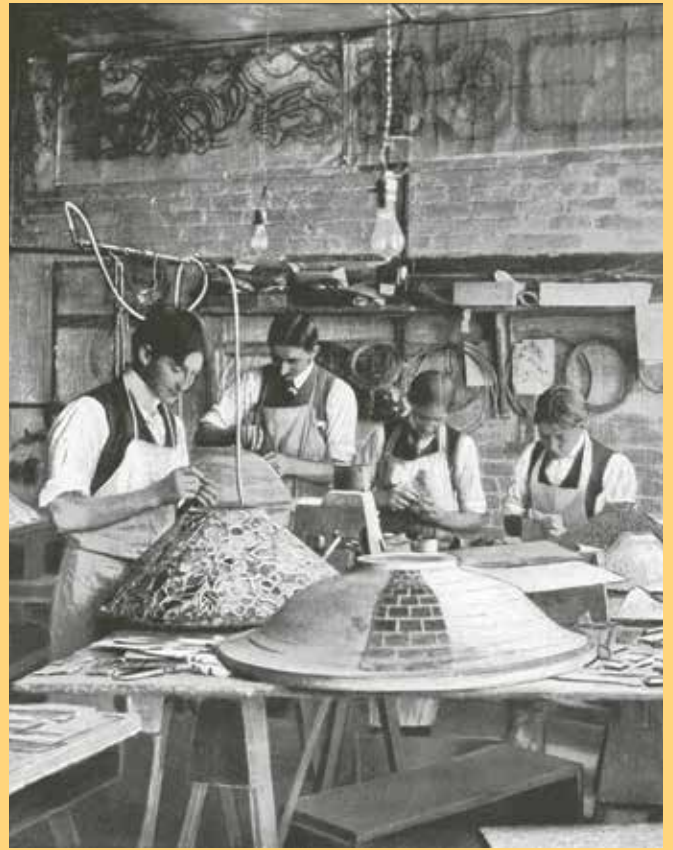
Light to Dream By
