


Metamorphosis and Cycle

bjects drawn by M.C. Escher are often illusions or tricks. Look closely at Day and Night. Close your eyes and then open them. What do you first see? Take time to look at the center of the image. Now, make your eye travel to the right . . . to the left. What changes? Stare at the bottom of the image; move your gaze up to the top. Now what changes?

The change in an Escher image is typically either metamorphosis or cycle. Metamorphosis is change from abstract (or unreal) to concrete (or real). A change or series of changes from one form to another and back to the original form is cycle.

List the objects that metamorphose – or change – in *Day and Night*. Hint: consider objects, time, and landscapes.



Where's the Artist?

M.C. Escher's *Drawing Hands* is a glimpse into an artist's studio and a piece of paper tacked to a board. Consider what the artist is drawing and what you are seeing. Are you looking at the hands of the artist drawing an image of a hand or is the hand the image? Similarly, artist Robin Lauersdorf draws imaginary compositions that seem to rise playfully from the paper in an artist's studio.
