Envisioning Wildlife and Wilderness with the Big Four



Journey into the vast wilderness and explore forty-five masterworks from four influential wildlife painters, known today as the "Big Four." *Survival of the Fittest* features the paintings of German-American Carl Rungius (1869-1959), German Wilhelm Kuhnert (1865-1926), Swede Bruno Liljefors (1860-1939), and German Richard Friese (1854-1918).

In the late 1800s, an emerging conservation movement, influenced by Charles Darwin's theories and often in collaboration with affluent hunters, aimed to preserve remaining wildlife populations. These developments influenced the Big Four, who began depicting animals in their natural environments, departing from previous portrayals of animals as characters in fables and biblical narratives or as anatomical subjects in natural history illustrations. Each of the four artists worked in different parts of the world. Still, they all shared a common intention: to present a vision of wildlife that valued the animal, its behavior, and its natural environment.

This stunning exhibition captivates viewers with awe-inspiring large-scale works depicting the beauty of nature and encourages visitors to contemplate their own relationship with the natural world.





From the Museum's Collection -

Through FEBRUARY 23, 2025 THE BIRD ROOM REDUX

n 2001, Midwest artist Nancy Hild (1948–2017) exhibited three larger-than-life canvases at the Chicago Cultural Center. Their installation was unusual. Rather than the typical museum or gallery wall, the three paintings instead hung in a structure-within-a-structure, a small-scale mausoleum and temple custom built for them. The structure, as well as the paintings' avian subjects, provided the inspiration for the exhibition's title:

The Bird Room. The paintings housed inside the structure reproduced taxidermy displays from the nearby Field Museum. Placed *in situ*, the three paintings became an immersive experience and an invitation into a complex conversation around the animal domain and sacred spaces. The Bird Room Redux redisplays the three original paintings, now in the Woodson's collection, and reproduces their historic display. The exhibition invites you to experience the "feeling of being overwhelmed...by a muted sense of wonder," as one critic described of the original installation.

Throughout art history, myths have served as a rich source of inspiration, shaping cultural narratives and artistic expression across different civilizations. Animals in particular have long held symbolic significance in mythology, representing powerful forces of nature, deities, and aspects of human experience. Across cultures, different animals are seen as embodiments of strength, wisdom, cunning, or protection, connecting the physical and spiritual worlds. Whether depicted as sacred companions, mythical hybrids, or tricksters, animals in myth help illustrate the relationship between humans and nature, conveying moral lessons and cultural values. Myth and Folly, featuring artwork from the Woodson's collection, explores these themes through several different mediums and animal avatars and examines how the use of myth and animals in art allows for the blending of imagination and tradition, offering insight into how these timeless stories inflect modern artistic movements.


